

Proceedings of the Commissioners

The Sheridan County Board of Commissioners (BOC) met on Tuesday, October 14, 2025, at the County Courthouse. Notice of the meeting was published in the Sheridan County Journal Star and on the County website sheridancountyne.gov. The meeting was open to the public and a ZOOM connection was also available. Present were Chairman James Krotz, Commissioners Bruce Messersmith and Dan Kling, Clerk Sindy Coburn and Treasurer Renee Thies.

Assessor Tina Skinner presented Correction Sheets for the acceleration of personal property taxes on six center pivots owned by Great Plains Farms LLC. The BOE approved all of the Corrections.

The BOE voted to set the Levies for fiscal year 2025-2026 as presented by the Clerk.

The Commissioners audited and approved claims for payment totaling \$223,562.

The BOC discussed and then voted to approve the proposed contract with MAXIMUS for services to recover certain costs borne by the County for legal services provided on behalf of the State.

Interim Road Superintendent Rod Norton reported that road-side mowing inspections should be completed next week. Norton also reported on a recent motor-grader safety workshop held for all county operators. He is engaged in on-going talks with other panhandle area Road Superintendents to develop a training cooperative training event for operators.

Mark Cover appeared to inquire about the status of the grant through Sen. Fischer's office for the re-paving of roads in the Antioch area. There has been no further activity to report.

Sheriff Jeff Brewer reported the metal detectors for the County and District Courtrooms are on-site but not yet installed.

The next regularly scheduled meeting of the BOE/BOC will be Tuesday, October 21. The minutes of this and all meetings of the Board of Commissioners will be available to the public at the office of the Sheridan County Clerk and now are available online at sheridancounty.ne.gov. All meetings of the Board of
